A charitable deduction is defined as a gift made to a charitable entity. Substantiation rules require receipts or other records from the charity in order to claim the deduction. Without documentation, the taxpayer may lose their deduction and possibly pay a penalty. Frivolous Issues Penalty

Accuracy-Related Penalties When a taxpayer fails to file a return or pay the full amount shown on the return, penalties begin to accrue. These two penalties combined can be as high as 25






